Today is forecasted to reach 34 degrees, with highs dropping to 19 on Thursday and 20 on Friday, according to NWS Wakefield.

Overnight Thursday, temperatures could dip as low as 3 degrees.

The weekend will see a slight warm up, with Satur-

day having a high of 39 and Sunday reaching 43.

The snow's effects began as early as 3 o'clock Monday when reports came in to the county's 911-dispatch center for cars sliding into roadside ditches and overturning.

From 4 p.m. Monday through 4 a.m. Tuesday,

Virginia State Police troopers responded to 212 traffic crashes and 97 disabled vehicles in its Division V service area, which includes Hampton Roads, Tidewater, Eastern Shore, Williamsburg, Franklin and Emporia.

Virginia Department of Transportation deployed crews as early as Sunday

afternoon to pretreat major roadways.

VDOT says it expects to have all state-maintained roads passable within 48 hours of the storm's ending.

All Isle of Wight and Surry schools were closed Tuesday, as were many government offices and businesses.

al park, as well as working with property owners.

So far, VDOT said it appears it can conceptually accommodate Isle of Wight's needs, Oliver said.

With no other options, the Board felt it was best to come up with some criteria that maybe VDOT could work with, Darden said.

Access to the intermodal park is "critical," Seward said, as well as a four-way interchange at Route 258 and the proposed bypass.

This preferred alignment was not the Board's decision, said Alphin.

Windsor resident Frank Grubbs called the proposed project "a road to nowhere." He was particularly critical of plans to open seven

lanes westward during an evacuation, only to have the highway reduced back to the existing lanes outside of Zuni.

It won't take long for backups to develop, he said.

Farmer Billy Gwaltney, who may be impacted twice by the bypass at his farm and at his residence, was far more critical.

"460 has been the most mismanaged road project in the history of Virginia," he said.

So far, the state has spent about \$300 million on the project without taking one shovelful of dirt. The original alignment was a 55-mile tolled limited access highway that was to run south of the existing Route 460, as well as Windsor.

That alignment also lined up with the development of Isle of Wight's intermodal park, which is located south of the existing Route 460.

However, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers put a stop to the project last year due to potential impacts on more than 600 acres of wetlands and ordered a supplemental environmental impact statement.

The "hybrid" preferred alignment is just 17 miles long — from the Route 460-58 interchange in Suffolk to just west of Zuni. Plans also include a bridge in Zuni to alleviate chronic flooding in the area. The preferred alignment is expected to impact just 52 acres of wetlands.

Darden said she's been told that it's unlikely the remaining 35 miles from Zuni to Petersburg will be constructed due to wetlands.

The preferred alternative is expected to cost from \$375 million to \$425 million and is fully funded. However, if the CTB votes against proceeding with the plan, the money will likely go to other road projects in the state, Darden said.

Improving Route 460 is expected to address three main concerns — increasing capacity for truck traffic coming from an expanded Port of Virginia, providing an enhanced evacuation route for Southside Hampton Roads and increase safety by separating regional and local traffic.

A concrete finisher that made \$14 per hour will now receive restitution to bring him or her to the \$20 per hour federal wage plus \$3.08 per hour in required fringe benefits.

Restitution pay ranges from \$34 to \$43,460 for individual employees, with most receiving between \$1,000 and \$10,000.

Several of the school division's federal bond documents reference the Davis-Bacon requirement, including a compliance agreement signed by school and county officials in 2011, but Davis-Bacon was omitted in the Sept. 13, 2012 construction contract between the School Board and Ritchie-Curbow.

The School Board unanimously approved an amendment in June 2014 to add the Davis-Bacon Act language to the contract.

A MUSICAL COMEDY ADAPTATION of "Sister Act," the 1992 movie starring Whoopi Goldberg, is a grand idea on paper. Indeed, the show about a hapless lounge singer on the run from her mobster boyfriend taking refuge in a convent has been a hit in London, on Broadway and elsewhere.

Homeschooler ends contest by means of "perestroika"

It took a few rounds, but a word from Russia's hopeful poet proved a winner for Eliza Wilder in The Virginian-Pilot Spelling Bee.

Wildcat, 12, correctly spelled "perestroika" to break a tense final-round battle and take the crown. Her older sisters, Caroline and Rebecca, are past winners of the contest.

The glitter and shimmer of "Sister Act," especially during the closing numbers, distracts and maybe entertains. But it leaves nothing for your soul.

Freedom and Justice

I reported last week that I was headed to Athens, Ohio for a Black History Month program focusing on the Black Press. I ended my column by noting I expected an informative and COLD visit.

This week, I report that both expectations were met. The weather was so COLD that my Black Press program scheduled for Thursday night was canceled when the entire Ohio University campus was shut down. With air temps below 0 degrees (without the wind chill factor), the environment was too frigid even for those who were accustomed to the cold.

But informative the visit was. The Wednesday night program featured Charlene Hunter Gault. For those of us from the Civil Rights Movement era, we remember her as one of two African Americans to desegregate under court order the University of Georgia in 1961.

She also is a noted American journalist, author and former foreign correspondent for National Public Radio, and the Public Broadcasting Service.

An accomplished former correspondent for the MacNeil/Lehrer Report, she is highly recognized in the field of journalism and has won two Emmys, and a Peabody for excellence in broadcast journalism. She also worked in Johannesburg, South Africa, as National Public Radio's chief correspondent and CNN's Johannesburg bureau chief and correspondent and today regularly appears as an African specialist. Her accolades abound. Hunter Gault was at the university to receive the Ohio University Scripps Howard School of Journalism's highest award.

Among the many gems I gleaned from her presentation in which she took her audience back to the days of the Civil Rights Movement and forward to today, was her query of what has happened to the movement's focus on "freedom and justice."

In recounting efforts to end the injustices associated with racial segregation that drove the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s, Hunter Gault said we no longer talk enough about "freedom and justice" in America when we talk about equal and fair opportunities for people of color, women and other historically oppressed

segments of society. Instead, she said, that dynamic duo—freedom and justice—which drove the movement's activism and passion has been replaced by the terms "diversity and inclusiveness."

Hunter Gault reminded us that becoming a diverse and inclusive nation—while admirable in its own right—is not what drove people of goodwill to march and protest racial injustices of the 50s and 60s. A diverse and inclusive nation is not the same as one that promotes freedom and justice in how it performs and responds to its varied populations, especially those who historically have been victimized by policies and practices that were (and often remain) unjust.

She was right. We are doing a better job in America of diversification. We operate in more diverse settings; our job market is more diverse today than in the past. We have more women and people of color in positions of leadership, directing school divisions, police departments and managing city and state governments. We especially have more Black-elected officials making laws today than at any other time in history. We even have a Black man who sits in the seat of power as President of the United States.

Yes, we are winning the diverse and inclusive battles to embrace people who have been invisible and excluded from positions of power in the past.

But the question raised by Hunter Gault is where are we as a nation on the issues of freedom and justice, especially for those still invisible and without a voice or power?

How "just" is our society where the incarceration rate among Black men and women is inordinately higher than its overall population?

How "just" is our nation's commitment to public schools that are failing miserably to educate low income children compared to children from middle class neighborhoods?

What does it mean to be "free" to vote when restrictive laws are being concocted to control who gets into elected offices where more laws and policies are made for enforcement?

Common and John Legend, the two musicians who wrote the song "Glory" that is sung in the movie "Selma", brought home that same message about "freedom and justice" to a larger audience recently at the Academy Awards.

PROFILE: MAYOR KENNETH WRIGHT Portsmouth mayor embraces his challenges

Portsmouth Mayor Kenny Wright could feel like a victim, if he actually had time to read the less-than-flattering headlines that have been written since he assumed office in 2010.

The problem is the mayor, age 51, visits four Portsmouth churches each Sunday. As mayor, he works about 100 hours a week. He talks to about 2,000 people a week. And he and his wife, Thomasina, have four daughters that range in age from 17 to 10. His oldest daughter was recently accepted into the engineering program at Georgia Tech. For 15 years, he and his wife have owned and operated Wright's Engineering and Design in Portsmouth.

"We are delivering on our promises," Wright said. "There is no greater reward than to make a contribution at home. That was one of the reasons why I ran for office. I was raised in Portsmouth. This is an opportunity for me to give back."

Like many opportunities, the mayor's first term came in the form of a crisis. Elected in 2010 after former Portsmouth Mayor James W. Holley III was forced out following a petition drive, Wright said he has made good on several campaign promises but is still trying to solve three challenges he said he inherited.

First, there is the challenge of communicating. "It was something I inherited," Wright said. "Mayor Holley was a great communicator. But jealousy and backbiting, no matter how great a communicator you are. They don't want you to get the credit. City Hall used to be a place where great ideas would go to die."

Wright said the second challenge is economic development. The third challenge is trying to create a new future for an old city. Scoring his efforts since he took office in 2010, Wright said, "I'd say we are at 70 percent (on economic development). I would give the third challenge (creating a new future for an old city) 80 percent."

"It is hard trying to share a vision because people have been so disappointed in the past," Wright said. "Politicians have taken office and never delivered. People have become so upset. It is hard to convince them that everyone is not like that."

"I took office about two days after I was elected," Wright explained. "I was sworn in two days later, because they had recalled Mayor Holley."

"Since I assumed office we have built a \$78 million courthouse — we built it two years ago," Wright said. "It is a state-of-the-art facility. We were being sued for having inadequate facilities. We also completed a \$14 million renovation of the Children's Museum. It has about 100,000-200,000 visitors each year."

"When I took office 10 locations of prime real estate were idle," Wright continued.

"We have developed a new Kroger, a Chick-fil-A and other projects. The Kroger site will yield about \$1 million in additional revenue. T. J. Maxx is coming to the Kroger site. We have a sporting goods store coming in Cato Fashions is coming. We are going to build a Wawa on another idle property site. We have opened four CVS stores."


There is also a new Harris Teeter in Chuchland. Upscale apartment units have been built in two different locations where old buildings were razed. Royal Farms which held its ribbon-cutting ceremony on Dec. 19 at its new location at 3701 Victory Blvd., presented a \$500 check to representatives

from some local charities that serve residents living near the new restaurant. John Kemp, president of Royal Farms, attended the grand opening. Launched in 1959, Royal Farms operates about 200 convenience stores in Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and Virginia. Meanwhile, a new 7-11 Store is being built.

"Major economic growth was needed in our city," Wright explained. "This is all brand-new revenue coming in since I took office. I ran on economic development. We are delivering on our promises."

But, this is the point where the less-than-flattering headlines come in.



FEBRUARY IS HEART HEALTH MONTH

PROFILE: DR. KEITH NEWBY

Local Cardiologist Is Medical Doctor and Businessman

Dr. Keith Newby could have thought like a victim at age 7 when his father passed away at age 41, but the survivor's mindset ran too deep inside of him.

The evidence is in the deft juggling act he performs seven days a week. For example, he sees 50-60 patients seven days a week in his office or at the hospital. In addition to running a busy practice, he runs an urgent care center, owns two restaurants, and operates a nearly 5-year-old foundation that honors his father, Dr. James E. Newby Jr. He also hosts two radio talk shows. He and his wife, Peggy, have three children.

"Part of my survivor's mindset obviously came from my mother, Clayte B. Newby," he explained. This does not mean he was not touched by the death of his father, who was diagnosed with a primary cardiac tumor in June 1970 and passed away six months later in January 1971.

Instead, it means his father's example, high expectations from his mother and relatives touched him more. "My mom would push me and say, 'Don't feel sorry for yourself.' She would not let us be a victim. Some people are victims because they are allowed to be victims. But I was brought up to believe that obstacles are something you are supposed to get around."

Newby, a noted cardiologist, is devoted to raising awareness about heart disease, especially during Heart Health Month which is observed in February. Blacks disproportionately experience heart failure, and it develops at a younger age, according to a 2009 study published in the New England Journal of Medicine. Heart failure means that the heart isn't able to pump blood as well as it should.

Blacks experience heart failure at a rate that is 20 times higher than whites before age 50, according to the study. Four risk factors are the strongest predictors of heart failure: high blood pressure (hypertension), chronic kidney disease, obesity, and low levels of good cholesterol.

At least 200,000 deaths from heart disease and stroke

are preventable, according to the Centers for Disease Control. Blacks are nearly twice as likely as whites to die from preventable heart disease and stroke, and more than half of preventable heart disease and stroke deaths occur before age 65.

Newby also spreads the word on WHRV 89.5. The fourth Friday of each month, he is a guest on Another View, which is hosted by Barbara Hamm Lee.

"I took an oath," Newby said. "I have a certain responsibility. Namely, to be a good doctor. That is what drives me. I raised my hand and took an oath."

While his mother did not push him to become a doctor, "she was elated when I went into medicine," said Newby who finished Eastern Virginia Medical School in 1990 after earning his bachelor's degree at Norfolk State University in 1986. He did his internship in Internal Medicine at Emory University Medical School in Atlanta, followed by a fellowship in cardiology with emphasis in invasive electrophysiology at Duke University Medical Center in Durham.


"I knew I had a lot to live up to," Newby explained in a 2014 interview in Hampton Roads Physician. "I knew I had to strive to be my best."

Does this mean thinking like a victim did not occur to Newby who is the founder and president of Fort Norfolk Plaza and Fort Norfolk Medical? The answer surfaces as you examine the chain-of-events he set in motion several years before he opened his new facility that he wanted to be accessible to doctors who treat Medicaid and Medicare patients. Look closely. Not one trait that experts say victims possess surfaced.

While victims believe outcomes swing on fate, luck, and powerful others. Victims share one belief. I'm helpless.

None of these traits surface in news reports. For example, one city council member did not favor the project after Newby approached city officials around 2003 in an effort to launch his modern medical office building in the Fort Norfolk area off West Brambleton Avenue.

Still, in February 2007, about four years later Norfolk City Council approved the \$85 million project. His

proposed medical center would be located across the street from a medical complex that includes Sentara Norfolk General Hospital, Eastern Virginia Medical School and Children's Hospital of The King's Daughter.

Here, Newby faced another (potential) obstacle. The city still did not have the land from the state for the medical facility. While the subprime mortgage crisis could have been an additional obstacle, Newby went back to the

drawing board and redesigned his project.

"People have told me that from all accounts this thing should have been dead a long time ago because of the time it's taken to get the land," he said in a March 23, 2008 interview in The Virginian-Pilot. "But I am 110 percent committed to getting this thing going because it's just too important a project to just let it go by the wayside."

This means in the end, Newby triumphed.

Specifically, in 2010, Newby opened his facility about seven years after he set a long chain-of-events in motion. His facility includes a medical building, jazz club, parking deck, and retail shops. In 2012, a fire caused major smoke damage. But Newby moved into the Wainwright building at 229 W. Bute St. in Norfolk.

"It was a challenge every step of the way," he said. "Some people wait for things to happen. I try to make

things happen."

"What drives me?" he asked pausing to reflect on his hectic schedule and multiple obligations. Once, for example, he worked 22 days straight without taking a day off. And he serves on several boards including Towne Bank and is a member of several professional groups including the Medical Society of Virginia and the American Medical Association. He is a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

Recently, he spoke at his church, First Baptist of Bute Street, where he is a deacon. That same weekend he spoke at a gala. And he wants more people to tune into his weekly call-in health show, Let's Talk Health, which airs on NSU's radio station, each Monday from 7 a.m.-8 a.m.

"All of this is what the oath I took was about," he said. "I am trying to make changes so I can get home to my family earlier. But I have to work toward that goal."

"Many people feel when you are a doctor that is all you should do. Or people believe all doctors play golf. I believe you should be versatile. You should always ask, 'What can I contribute to the world?'"

Recently, on my radio show, a psychologist and I discussed stress and heart disease. I think it is a good show. I volunteer my time for that. I would like to have more listeners tune in. I am doing this for the community. No one else is doing a medical talk show. I like being a pioneer."

Brown v. Board of Education Scholarship Committee Virginia General Assembly

The Brown v. Board of Education Scholarship Committee of the Virginia General Assembly announces the availability of applications for the 2015-2016 academic year. The Brown Scholarship Program was established by the Virginia General Assembly in 2004 to provide educational opportunities for persons who were denied a public education in the localities of Arlington, Charlottesville, Norfolk, Prince Edward County, and Warren County, due to the closing of the public schools to avoid desegregation during Massive Resistance between 1954 and 1964. 

I am pleased to announce that we have set our schedule of meetings for the 2016 Hampton Roads Hazard Mitigation Plan update. Several of us have been working hard in the background on this project, and it's time to share what we have and gather your feedback.

Due to the large number of communities involved in this plan and the geographic area covered, we have provided a choice of three locations for each meeting. Your planning committee only needs to attend one meeting for each jurisdiction. For example, Hampton's committee would likely choose HMPC 5, HMPC 6 and HMPC 9 to attend. It will help if I know which meetings your group plans to attend, but it's not mandatory. The most important meetings are in the "Workshop 2" group because that is when we will select the mitigation actions for your community moving forward. We will hold a Webinar in early 2016 to share the mitigation action plan with all of you.

Who should attend? These meetings are open to the public and will be advertised on the HRPC web site, but will not be advertised in the newspapers. These are the working meetings for each community's hazard mitigation planning committee and, as such, we need the committee members plus any stakeholders who you feel will contribute the most valuable knowledge and advice to the process. I recommend gathering a group of staff representing various departments, to include at a minimum: planning, codes compliance, emergency management, utilities, public information and engineering. You may also want to include parks & rec, school system, finance, manager/administration/elected officials, fire and police leaders, GIS, public health, housing/community development, local hospitals and colleges or universities, environmental groups, American Red Cross, CERT members, economic development, homeowner's associations/clubs and risk management. I will handle invitations to regional utilities, regional governmental organizations, state and Federal agencies.

CRS communities have special considerations in composing their committee. I will be glad to help your community compose your committee, but please familiarize yourself with the elements of Activity 310, Floodplain Management Planning (pages 510-4 thru 510-28) first, because several items are mandatory. Failure to get sufficient points or meet some minimum requirements could be detrimental to your CRS program. In the CRS or contemplating CRS

includes: Norfolk, Portsmouth, Va Beach, Isle of Wight Co, Poquoson, Chesapeake, Hampton, Newport News, James City County, and York County.

Three important points for CRS communities:

1. Ensure that your community CRS Coordinator gets this email and helps put together your committee. Provide a list of your committee members to me so that I may take attendance at meetings.
2. Keep copies of invitations, logs of phone calls, or other evidence of who you invite to participate on the committee. This information must be provided to me for inclusion in the appendices.
3. CRS communities must send at least 2 representatives to the regional committee meetings. Section 322 of DMA 2000 requires that state and local governments develop a hazard mitigation plan in order to remain eligible for pre- and post-disaster mitigation funding. These funds include the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA) and the Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) program, which are administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). 




Public divided over Norfolk School Board's \$122,000 travel fund

NORFOLK The School Board on Wednesday heard conflicting opinions on its increased travel budget.

One speaker criticized the increase, saying the money could go to school needs. Another praised the board's plan to travel more for training.

A week ago, The Virginian-Pilot reported that the Norfolk School Board plans to spend more on nonroutine travel than all other local divisions combined.

The board previously voted to increase its operational budget by about 60 percent, even though it might cut teacher positions and reduce staff raises.

Out-of-town travel accounts for most of the board's budget increase, totaling about \$122,000.

Norfolk officials say they face unique challenges as a school division, including educating high numbers of children in poverty.

Board members criticized the Pilot's report in a meeting last week, saying the travel budget is a small part of the overall budget and that the state requires them to receive training.

Grace Jordan, a Blair Middle School parent, said even though the \$122,000 is a small part of the division's overall budget of approximately \$320 million, the money could buy school supplies or sports uniforms.

"If you ask, you will probably get similar suggestions from all of your schools," she said.

Board members have said they need more training, in part, to help improve the division and because of turnover. The division's test scores rank among the lowest in the state.

The state Education Department requires and pays for the board to attend one training session in Charlottesville. The other trips are extra, but members say they want to exceed basic training requirements.

"As a taxpayer and parent, I sincerely hope, Chairman Jordan, that you will reconsider," Grace Jordan said.

But speaker Ellis James praised the board's decision to travel for training, saying it can help improve schools.

"I consider the newspaper's approach to that particular coverage as a bit job," he said. "I as a taxpayer and my family and many of my friends wish it to be expanded from two to four lanes. A retention pond in the original construction plans would have required the removal of the tree.

In the memo, Eric Martin, the city's director of public

works, noted a Virginian-Pilot story about the tree that ran last week.

"Staff has since directed the design consultant to re-design the retention area to preserve the tree," he wrote. "Additionally, the construction contract will require monitoring of the tree by a certified arborist throughout construction."

Massive, old live oak in Chesapeake spared from highway expansion

CHESAPEAKE Looks like the state's fifth-largest live oak tree has been granted amnesty, according to a memo sent to the City Council on Monday.

The live oak is likely hundreds of years old and sits along a section of Portsmouth Boulevard that is set to be expanded from two to four lanes. A retention pond in the original construction plans would have required the removal of the tree.

In the memo, Eric Martin, the city's director of public

works, noted a Virginian-Pilot story about the tree that ran last week.

"Staff has since directed the design consultant to re-design the retention area to preserve the tree," he wrote. "Additionally, the construction contract will require monitoring of the tree by a certified arborist throughout construction."

"Awesome!" said Gary Williamson by phone Monday. He is one of two volunteers who measured and submitted the live oak for Virginia Tech's big tree program six years ago.

"I think it's a fine idea to

have an arborist," Williamson added. "The more expertise you get regarding that tree, the better."

Williamson volunteered to pull on his work gloves and pull up the weeds and clinging vines that obscure much of the tree from view.

"I'm glad to hear they're going to do what they can to keep it from meeting its demise," said Robert Johnson, who has driven past the tree many times over the years.

The Suffolk resident recently took a Sunday drive with his wife so she could get a closer look at the tree.

"She was very impressed," he said. "It's awe-inspiring when you walk up to it."

And now even more people will get to see the tree, he said.

Hopefully someone will clean it up, Johnson added, though according to Elizabeth Vaughn, a spokeswoman with the city's Department of Public Works, there are no immediate plans to

do so.

"We won't be doing anything around it before construction begins," Vaughn wrote in an email.

After the Pilot story ran, Vaughn said the city heard from a handful of residents in favor of saving the tree.

Facebook posts on the Western Branch - Growing Forward page about the tree also garnered a number of responses.

"How nice!" Glory Carnes Byrns wrote. "I hope that the tree will also become more visible after construction for all to admire."

From the city's perspective, Vaughn said it was absolutely worth taking another look at the plans in order to preserve the "impressive" tree.

"When we discovered we could make some modest changes while still working within our existing design," she said, "it was apparent that saving the tree was just the right thing to do."

N.C. regulators, state department disagree on future of ash pits

All coal-ash pits in North Carolina maintained by Duke Energy power plants pose enough of an environmental risk that they should be excavated and moved by 2024, state environmental regulators said Wednesday.

But the state Department of Environmental Quality said it's asking for a change in state law that would allow it to reconsider its risk assessment in 18 months.

The agency was required to submit its risk rankings for all 33 pits by Wednesday under a state law passed in 2014, after a spill at a Duke Energy coal-ash pit coated 70 miles of the Dan River in a toxic sludge. Afterward, hundreds of neighbors were warned not to drink their well water. The law required that eight pits at four plants be excavated by 2019.

Fewer pits would have to be excavated if repairs to dams retaining the liquefied waste are finished, the agency said.

Duke Energy said in a statement that it wanted the cheaper alternative - draining excess water and covering the remaining residue in plastic and dirt - for all but the eight highest-risk pits.

The company said that could be possible once "neighbors have the assurance of a high-quality wa-

ter supply." That could include extending municipal water lines to homes that have used water wells, Duke Energy CEO Lynn Good said during a teleconference with reporters.

Environmentalists warn that covering the unlined coal ash pits could continue allowing toxic pollutants to escape for decades.

Two years ago, Duke Energy estimated it could cost up to \$40 billion to excavate all its coal ash dumps, with electricity customers paying the bills. Good said Wednesday she could not provide a newer estimate.

The company had been expecting to be able to cap most of its pits and estimated its likely costs at about \$4 billion, which could raise a 55-day counter-drug and migrant patrol that netted more than \$10.1 million in seized cocaine and marijuana, the Coast Guard said.

Dependable's crew "overcame numerous challenges working with obsolete systems and conducting difficult maintenance and repairs to electronic and mechanical systems in order to keep our 48-year-old ship in the fight," Cmdr. Bob Little, the cutter's commanding officer, said in a statement.

Dependable, which returned Tuesday, also worked with Coast Guard Sector Key West to intercept two vessels carrying 22 migrants trying to enter the U.S. illegally, the Coast Guard said.

Description of the Regional Hazard Mitigation Planning Process


Representatives from select communities in the Hampton Roads Planning District Commission (HRPDC), decided to pursue a regional multi-jurisdictional hazard mitigation planning process. The Hazard Mitigation Planning Subcommittee (HMPC) was formed in order to engage in the mitigation planning process and adopt a single updated mitigation plan for the region. Led by the HRPDC and Salter's Creek Consulting, Inc., the targeted completion of the plan update process is November 1, 2016.

Purpose of the Hazard Mitigation Plan

Section 322 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5165, as amended by the Disaster Mitigation Assistance Act of 2000) requires local jurisdictions to develop and adopt hazard mitigation plans to be eligible to receive certain federal mitigation grant funds. The statute also requires that local mitigation plans be updated and revised every five years in order to maintain eligibility for grant funds.

Public Involvement Is Critical

Public involvement is a key component of the FEMA planning guidance and the Community Rating System (CRS) planning requirements. Stakeholders will guide community leaders in implementing tailored strategies for enlisting public input throughout the planning process, and

Virginian-Pilot editorial: Mitigating Hampton Roads' many hazards

While it's nearly impossible to prevent a natural disaster, adopting precautions in preparation can drastically reduce the loss of life and property.

For Hampton Roads, such planning is essential. The area's growing population, along with its unique geography, means more people are at risk with each passing year.

The region faces the constant threat of flooding and tropical storms, problems made worse by a changing climate, rising sea levels and land subsidence. Other natural disasters — tornadoes, earthquakes, wildfires and crippling winter storms — have all occurred in the past decade.

In order to be eligible for certain public funds, the federal government requires that localities prepare and regularly update so-called "hazard mitigation" plans. It can be a tedious undertaking, but it is also a process with real value.

These plans help provide an unvarnished assessment of vulnerabilities and the steps taken to minimize risk. It forces communities to take the long view on planning decisions as well, and to keep emergency assessment in the forefront of their thinking.

Last year, communities across Hampton Roads decided to alter their approach to this mandate by joining to craft a regionwide mitigation plan. This is not an entirely new idea; the 2011 updated mitigation plan for the Southside involved the cities of Virginia Beach, Norfolk, Portsmouth, Suffolk and Isle of Wight County.

But this effort is greater in scope and includes participation from 10 cities, eight towns and four counties — focused on a region stretching from Gloucester County in the north to the North Carolina border in the south, and from Southampton County in the west to Virginia Beach in the east.

Officials from each jurisdiction participated in the expansive effort, and the public was invited to contribute at every step.

The draft document is now ready for review and comment. Citizens are certainly encouraged to examine the nearly 500-page plan, but it is essential reading for every public official and anyone who works in emergency planning or response.

It echoes many of the local mitigation plans that have been previously written and were in need of updating. The draft proposal specifies the specific challenges unique to each community but also includes areas of shared concern, where partnerships and cooperation make natural sense.

While that may seem a straightforward approach for a place like Hampton Roads, trying to facilitate this type of multijurisdictional collaboration is often an exercise in frustration. So it is worth cheering when communities join to find regional solutions to shared public concerns.

The process is still in its draft stage, and there are two ways citizens can participate in the process.

The first is by taking an online survey, which can be found at the Hampton Roads Planning District Commission website (www.hrpdcva.gov). It requires only a few minutes and asks residents to provide input about their community and neighborhood concerns, to ensure observations at the ground level are reflected in the plan.

The other is by reading the draft, which is also available at the HRPDC website or through most regional emergency planning websites, and providing comments on its proposals. The HRPDC asks that input be directed to John Sadler, emergency management administrator, by email at jsadler@hrpdcva.gov or by phone at 757-420-8300.

There will be other opportunities for the public to weigh in; this is by no means the final step in the process. However, this year's approach is especially ambitious and would be served by citizens' involvement.





APPENDIX D

Hazard Mitigation Survey Response to Questions 14 & 17

The community needs a comprehensive and rigorously conducted, all hazard risk assessment. The risk assessments in the 2011 Peninsula and South Hampton Roads mitigation plans seem to be biased toward “conventional environmental hazards.” Information provided in 2011 plans makes it clear that vulnerability to some hazards was excluded from consideration. These omissions diminish the value of the risk assessments for comprehensive hazard planning.

A comprehensive, all hazard planning methodology requires that:

- All feasible hazards are identified
- Likelihood and consequence of each hazard are evaluated
- The effects of each hazard on critical infrastructure, resources and services are identified
- The effects of hazards on critical infrastructure, resources and services are evaluated both individually and in aggregate
- Mitigation and consequence management decisions are based on both the risk of each individual hazard and also the aggregated risk of all identified hazards to critical infrastructure, resources and services

The 2011 plans do not apply a methodology similar to that outlined above. The plans do treat “conventional environmental hazards” (hurricane, flooding and other weather related phenomena) and some ancillary low risk hazards (fires, drought, dam failure and hazmat incidents) from the perspective of individual risk but do not consider aggregated risk. It also appears that, some “non-environmental hazards” were intentionally excluded from the hazard assessments. This was reinforced during the March 3rd public meeting when some of these hazards were characterized as “too hard to mitigate.” The existing plans also seem to focus on the mitigation of risk and damage to property, especially via land use planning. Vulnerability to loss of life and mitigations that may save lives are not treated in the same detail. It appears that a bias exists, in the current plans, against planning for hazards that are more difficult to conceptualize, are not modelled by HAZUS-MH or cannot be mitigated through land use planning.

Specifically, the 2011 plans do not adequately address these hazards:


1. Pandemic Flu and Infectious Disease (PI&ID)
2. Electro-Magnetic Pulse (EMP)
3. Terrorism, especially cyber terrorism
4. Extra-regional events that impose adverse consequences in the Hampton Roads region

The methodology described above can be illustrated by considering these four types of events. The probability of each of these events is no less than “Moderate” and all have the potential to impose sustained, wide-spread loss of electrical power in addition to other critical services. This effect on electrical power is likely to occur when an infectious disease prevalence is equivalent to the 1918-19 influenza pandemic, during an EMP equivalent to the 1859 Carrington solar flare event, when an effective cyber terrorism attack on electrical infrastructure occurs or following an earthquake in the San Madrid Seismic Zone equivalent to the 1811 disaster.

The consequence of each of these events individually should be sufficient to warrant the expenditure of mitigation resources. However, the aggregated risk to electrical power distribution from these events very clearly supports expending mitigation resources.

An approach that focuses on identifying the effects that individual hazards impose on critical infrastructure, resources and services not only supports making decisions based on aggregated risk, it also provides for inherent all-hazard resilience. For example, by preparing for the effects of sustained power disruption *regardless of the cause*, the consequences of even unforeseen and un-analyzed hazards are mitigated.

The current hazard mitigation effort presents an opportunity to conduct a comprehensive all-hazard risk analysis that can be used to inform both mitigation and consequence management planning. Such an analysis is the single most important action for community hazard planning.



















APPENDIX E: REVIEW COMMENTS

This section of the Plan includes each of the written comments received by various parties during review of the plan, as well as a response from the primary consultant addressing each comment in detail.

Reviewer: Bill Sammler, National Weather Service**Date: May 3, 2016**

1. Comment: A request for my input on page 43. I would re-word the sentence as follows: "Direct impacts from hurricanes category 3 and 4 intensity are rare in Hampton Roads due to 1). historical tracks remaining offshore or impacting land before reaching Hampton Roads; and cooler Atlantic Ocean water temperatures north of Cape Hatteras, which diminish a storm's ability to maintain intensity, or intensify. A Category 5 hurricane is considered implausible in Hampton Roads due to the cooler water temperatures mentioned above."
Response: Revised
2. Comment: On page 49, the note you have regarding Joaquin. There should be no reference to Joaquin in the document, as Joaquin had no direct impact on Hampton Roads. There should be some info regarding the coastal flooding associated with an anomalously strong/nearly stationary area of high pressure over New England. This produced a prolonged period of NE winds that resulted in the early October coastal flooding.
Response: Revised
3. Page 51 - first paragraph should be rewritten to read: "According to the NWS, tornado wind speeds normally range from 40 to more than 200 mph. The most violent tornadoes (EF5) have rotating winds of 200 mph or more and are capable of causing extreme destruction and turning normally harmless objects into deadly missiles."
Response: Revised
4. Page 51 - second paragraph, last sentence should read: "Highly destructive tornadoes may carve out a path over a mile wide and tens of miles long."
Response: Revised
5. Page 65 - Figure 4-20 - I would suggest deleting in favor of Figure 4-21. I don't see the usefulness of Figure 4-21, given the low resolution of the graphic.

Reviewer: Jim Redick, City of Norfolk

Date: May 16, 2016

1. Comment: No reference to the [National Disaster Mitigation Framework](#) in Introduction or throughout. This Framework is part of FEMA’s National Preparedness Goal and deserves mention.
Response: Revised in section 1 and section 6 to include mention and discussion.
2. Comment: Surge flooding (p. 4:10) is no longer associated with the Saffir-Simpson Wind scale. Here are a couple articles: http://usatoday30.usatoday.com/weather/storms/hurricanes/2010-05-12-storm-surge-hurricane-scale_N.htm and <https://www2.ucar.edu/atmosnews/perspective/7834/hurricane-storm-surge-category-its-own>.
Response: Concur and the Saffir Simpson table indicates this. However discussion on 4:10 is about the SLOSH model and our understanding is that the model still associates the surge and wind for modeling purposes.
3. Comment: Sea Level Rise and Land Subsidence section starting at p. 4:25:
a. Maybe cite some local sources like [ODU](#) and possibly the [State report](#) on Recurrent Flooding. DHS has also conducted a study on the potential impacts to critical infrastructure due to SLR.
b. I don’t recall seeing anything about the impacts of increased wave activity due to greater amounts of inundation.
c. Perhaps some of Norfolk’s objectives might also come from the [State report](#)? As well as [Vision2100](#)? The Resilience Office and HUD grant objectives?
Response: Revised section 5 on pages 5:26 and 5:27 to include added effects from ODU site. Added localized impacts to section 4 at 4:26. See p. 4:25, paragraph 2 (added) and paragraph 4 (previously included discussion about wave activity). Objectives in this plan are regionwide and the committee worked through developing them as a group. Revisions specifically for Norfolk would have to be added by Norfolk in an appendix at a later date.
4. Comment: Per comment on p. 4:49, Norfolk did experience shoreline erosion during Joaquin / Noreaster last October.
Response: Revised
5. Comment: Worth referencing the 2012 Regional THIRA for Hurricane?
Response: Revised in section 6, page 6:5.
6. Comment: Mention Commodity Flow Study for Chesapeake, Norfolk, Portsmouth and Suffolk as a shared objective for HazMat Incident? And maybe the process by which the VEOC makes contact with the appropriate locality(ies) when they are notified of inbound Hazardous Materials?
Response: Included as Regional Mitigation Action #4

7. Comment: While discussing NFIP properties, it might be worth mention these are the ones we know about... that there are likely uninsured properties in under-resourced neighborhoods which also experience damage due to flooding. Possible to reference and cite Dr. Behr's and Dr. Diaz's study from ODU?
Response: Revised section 5 discussion.
8. Comment: P. 5:15 – a goal should be to update HAZUS with more accurate data as to better reflect more accurate cost impacts.
Response: Revised Regional Mitigation Action #3.
9. Comment: P. 5:17 – Who's map is this? Maybe use HRPDC's maps? Maybe somewhere list the different flood impact viewer tools for each locality?
Response: Map pertains to wildfire not flood. Flood map property viewers for each locality added to section 4.
10. Comment: Capability Assessment (P. 6:1) – mention the Region V Measures? Also, on what standards is Table 6.1 based? NFPA 1600? EMAP? CRS?
Response: Unsure what "Region V measures" are. Table 6.1 is based on amalgamation of various documents over the past 10 years as used by consultant.
11. Comment: Table 6.3 – In the spirit of whole-of-community, wouldn't *access* to people/resources suffice rather than actual City staff?
Response: Revised table before sentence to clarify that this was approach used.
12. Comment: P. 6:16, second bullet for Norfolk – The city has also acquired Everbridge, calling it Norfolk Alert, which will be used to alert those properties in flood-prone areas of the need to evacuate, etc.
Response: Revised
13. Comment: P. 6:17, next to last bullet for Norfolk, change "Public Works" to "The city..." Also, Norfolk GIS developed another tool called TITAN ([Tidal Inundation Tracking Application for Norfolk](#)) which shows potential flooding based on current tide projections or hypothetical scenarios. Note: a small MLLW to NAVD88 conversation of -1' must be used for better accuracy.
Response: Revised without the note.
14. Comment: Norfolk Mitigation Actions (p. 7:89)
 - a. #3 – I believe this to be completed with the procurement of Everbridge / NorfolkAlert.
 - b. #4 and #5 – Rather than limiting the resources to just CERT, perhaps say stakeholder agencies (all who have a role to play in flood management and response and can disseminate flood-related information).
 - c. #6 – Perhaps list inclusion in the [USACE EPFAT program](#) as the desired goal first while funding is being sought for generators?
 - d. #10 – Along with recommendation, another consideration might be to have volunteers identified, trained and used to capture and submit high-water marks for inclusion in data mapping as well as damage assessments to the state.
 - e. #12 – Instead of identifying if and how a property has been mitigated, how about *changing* it to decrease the number of SLR and RL properties?Response: Revised
15. Comment: I wonder if under Mitigation Strategy (p. 7:1), consideration should be coordination with and/or projects in line with Virginia's State Resilience Officer and VDEM State Resilience Officer in the region and/or the soon-to-be updated [Floodplain Management Plan for the Commonwealth of Virginia](#).
Response: It is the consultant's hope that the VDEM input over several meetings, emails and reviews will help provide this coordination. Discussions with VDEM officials at project onset helped set the stage.
16. Comment: Additional mitigation actions for Norfolk:
 - a. Develop and implement a Post-Incident Data Collection Plan - deploy volunteers, damage assessment teams, low-cost sensors and community (via social media) to capture high water data and marks.

- b. Have projects / designs / applications prepared in advance for potential, unannounced, short-fused funding opportunities.
- c. In coordination with Chief Marketing Officer, establish communication / information sharing plans and coordinate outreach materials - all using the same information and/or consolidating into one effort.
- d. Partner with higher education and Norfolk Public Schools and invest in the education of Norfolk's youth and college graduates – the city and region's future scientists and planners.

Response: These items were reviewed and incorporated with the assistance of Robert Tajan, City of Norfolk. In some cases, they were incorporated as aspects of other mitigation actions rather than as completely separate actions.

Response: This was the date of the declaration, not the event. Clarified column title.
3. Comment: Section 4 page 8 – These appear to be the wrong flood maps for Portsmouth. It looks like the 2009 maps instead of the 2015 maps.
Response: Revised map to reflect current flood data, but HAZUS modeling was done at project outset and, out of necessity, was based on current effective flood data.
4. Comment: Section 6 page 6 – Portsmouth has adopted the 2012 USBC.
Response: Revised
5. Comment: Section 6 page 11 & 12 – These sections seem to only reference Chesapeake. Certainly, those do not apply to the other localities.

6. Comment: Section 6 page 14 – Under “Regional Activities”, the CRS Workgroup is the Coastal Virginia

Response: Revised to add dams with limited data from DCR; however, map cannot be revised until the National Inventory of Dams is updated to include all cities in Virginia. This will be done prior to plan publication.
3. Comment: Page 6.6 references the 2009 VA USBC, however, the 2012 VA USBC went into effect in 2014
Response: Revised
4. Comment: Page 6.11 only references Chesapeake, not the broader region in the text.

2. Comment: Section 7, Mitigation Strategy, Page 33, Shoreline and Roadway along Chesapeake Ave, the proposed amount was \$20M not \$1M. Also, we should add a line item stating that this proposed project was not approved or selected by HUD for Newport News (they announced it on January 21, 2016).

1. Comment: Table 3.1 shows the City of Franklin being 42 square miles. It is actually 8.75 square miles.

1. Comment: Table 3.2, the temperature and precipitation statistics for the region. The maximum temperature data looked off to me, since summertime temperatures can easily rise into the 90s and sometimes even the 100s. Why would the table list maximum temperatures in the 70s? That just doesn't jive with my experience here in Isle of Wight County. Is the table inaccurate or am I misinterpreting the data?

Response: Doublechecked the data from the source and then requested clarification from NWS. Response from Bill Sammler: "Those numbers look correct to me, Leigh. One must remember that these are annual averages, and not averages for a particular season or month. Basically, winter "cancels out" summer (from a practical perspective), and the spring/autumn averages are close to the annual average."

Note: The full text of Mr. Donegan's comments is available upon request from the HRPDC. The following are his Conclusions and Recommendations.

1. Comment: HRPDC's attempts at conducting public outreach for and incorporating public feedback into the HRHMP planning process were so ineffective as to obstruct meaningful public participation.

Response: Steering Committee members and other consultants nationwide note that public participation is generally low for similar planning efforts unless a recent disaster has brought mitigation issues to the forefront of the public conscious. While the committee felt that our *efforts* were worthwhile, the results were admittedly less than desired. An additional effort was made to gather public feedback in summer 2016 and the results have been documented in Section 2 and the appendices.

2. Comment: HRPDC efforts produced no public participation of significance and generated scant public feedback in time to affect the substantive decision making and planning processes.

Response: Concur. As stated above, additional efforts were made to gather public feedback in summer 2016, edit the plan as indicated, and the results have been documented in Section 2 and the appendices.

3. Comment: Although HRPDC had limited public feedback in its possession, it withheld this from the Planning Committee during decision-making and planning sessions.

Response: Information obtained from public comment was utilized in both presentations to the planning committee and drafting of the plan. Additionally, in July 2016, we reached back out to the committee with all of the public feedback received and asked that each community reconvene

their subgroup to discuss the public feedback and report back to the PDC whether the information resulted in recommended changes to any sections of the plan, including Sections 4 and 5.

4. Comment: The HRHMP presents a narrative surrounding public outreach, participation, feedback collection and incorporation, and communication with the public that is so inaccurate it distorts the facts to the point an external reviewer cannot effectively evaluate 44 CFR §201.6 compliance.
Response: While we do not concur that the Section 2 narrative is fundamentally inaccurate, nor that it hinders evaluation against 44 CFR §201.6, we have made minor revisions to the descriptions as suggested, in an effort to address the stated concerns.
5. Comment: As a result, the 2016 Hampton Roads Hazard Mitigation Plan does not comply with requirements 44 CFR §201.6 as interpreted and articulated in FEMA Local Mitigation Plan Review Guide, October 1, 2011. The plan appears to be noncompliant with Element A.3 and only partially compliant with Element A.1
Response: Element A1 requires documenting the planning process and indicating how the public was involved as we have done in Section 2. Element A3 requires that the planning process include an opportunity for the public to comment on the plan during drafting stage and prior to plan approval. We have hosted and adequately advertised 5 public meetings, regionally distributed throughout the planning area, to gather public comment, and have added an additional meeting in September and more outreach in summer 2016. It is our opinion that this amount of public outreach is ample. Plan adoption will not occur until later fall 2016, so all of this outreach happened prior to adoption by communities.
6. Recommendation: HRPDC should attempt to achieve full compliance with Element A.1 of the Guide by implementing the recommendations provided above to correct the misrepresentations in the HRHMP regarding public outreach, participation, feedback collection and incorporation, and communication with the public.
Response: As indicated in 4 above, we have made revisions to the descriptions in Section 2 in an effort to address the stated concerns.
7. Recommendation: As described in the above section regarding Incorporation of Public Feedback, the only point in the HRHMP development process [where] substantive public feedback could be practically incorporated in a meaningful way was during the Planning Committee meetings of late 2015. After those meetings, the decision-making and planning processes were so advanced that to incorporate substantive public comment would require reconvening the Planning Committee to develop new elements of the plan from new entering arguments. Such activity would be a misuse of grant funding, taxpayer dollars and municipal staff time. At this point in the plan development process there is no reasonable, cost effective, action to remediate the omission of public feedback. As a result, conducting additional public outreach to collect feedback that may alter the structure of the plan is not recommended.
Response: We have delayed the review and adoption process by several weeks to make additional efforts to seek committee feedback on previously-obtained public comment, to obtain additional public comment, to repost the hazard mitigation plan, to host another public meeting and to again ask for committee feedback on public comments.
8. Recommendation: HRPDC should seek agreement with state and federal regulators to move forward with the plan while noting its non-compliance with Element A.3. HRPDC should propose that this deficiency be remediated by the development of detailed corrective action plan. The detailed corrective action itself should be the focus of a concerted effort to generate public involvement. This corrective action plan should be used as the basis for structuring the Continued Public Involvement section of the HRHMP.
Response: We disagree that the plan does not comply with Element A3 as noted in 5 above. We will restructure the Continued Public Involvement subsection in Section 8 to include more detail on the recommended strategies. The HRPDC cannot, however, dictate or mandate how individual communities implement the plan during the 5 years after adoption. The strategies are simply actions that may have proven effective for other communities in the past. We have added an Opportunities for Improvement subsection in Section 8 to identify possible methods for improving public outreach in future updates to the plan.
9. Recommendation: The current Continued Public Involvement section of the HRHMP should be replaced with a new section that incorporates the corrective action plan described above. This section, in its current form, is not credible given the dearth of public involvement achieved during

18 months of supposedly dedicated effort. It is impossible to forecast the success of planned actions such as:

- Advertising meetings of the committee in the local newspaper, public bulletin boards, web sites, social media and City buildings;
- Designating willing citizens and private sector representatives as official members of the planning committee;
- Using local media to update the public about any maintenance or periodic review activities taking place;
- Using questionnaires and Open Houses to obtain public comments on the Plan and its implementation;
- Using community web sites to advertise any maintenance or periodic review activities taking place; and
- Maintaining copies of the Plan in public libraries, on the web, or other appropriate venues. (HRHMP 8:4)

Response: Public involvement during the 5-year period between plan updates is up to the discretion of each community's committee and, for this reason, is not specified or required in detail in the plan. In Section 8, the plan provides some guidance for ideas that have worked in the past for Hampton Roads or other communities and provides some ideas for involving the public. Again, these are strategies and ideas, not mandates. We will investigate other methods that have worked nationwide and add detail or other options to this section.

10. Recommendation: However, it clear that similar aspirations expressed during the past 18 months did not produce any meaningful public involvement. Therefore, HRPDC should conduct a thorough examination to determine how such poor participation was tolerated during the current effort and what best practices could be applied to generate meaningful public participation during HRHMP maintenance and 2021 revision. This examination should be the precursor to and should inform the development of, the corrective action plan.

Response: See 8 above for actions that we will take to modify the plan in response to this comment.

1. Comment: I am concerned because in the chart 4.8 the Ocean and Lake surf events Hampton is only listed on the final event of last year. That is incorrect. Strong waves hit the beaches and flooded neighborhoods on the following dates which already have other cities listed for these events: 1) Oct 2006; 2) Nov 2006; 3) Nov 2009; 4) Oct 2012. Also no area is listed as being effected for surf during Isabel Sept 2003. That caused massive flooding and damage in the whole region. The current was so strong it blew an opening in the beach at Factory Point which needed to be repaired. I thought maybe it was left off because it was a named storm but then realized you had already listed Sandy which was also a named storm. Thank you for looking into this matter I do not want it to appear Hampton does not have issues resulting from waves.

Response: Thank you for the careful review of the table. We have added this information to Table 4:8.

1. Comment: Overall- There does not seem to be any sensitivity analysis of the potential effects of climate change. While all the references are best practices - they primarily focus on historical data. Many municipalities and regions in the Northeast have recognized this and have included this analysis in the HMP updates (e.g. Manchester-by-the-Sea, MA).

Response: Climate change is a sensitive political topic and attempting to have all of the elected officials in Hampton Roads agree on the potential effects of climate change would likely have become a strong focus of the plan, thereby detracting from the necessary focus on mitigation

actions. By focusing on historical impacts in Section 5, and providing just one potential scenario as selected from the sensitivity analysis which is included in the 2012 report referenced (*Climate Change in Hampton Roads, Phase III: Sea Level Rise in Hampton Roads, Virginia*), we felt that the vulnerability was sufficiently described in enough detail for the committee and the public to prepare associated mitigation actions.

2. Comment: Frictional Effects - How valid are the model outputs if the data inputs are based on the NLCD data from 2001? In addition to significant anthropogenic land use changes, we have had at least one major hurricane (Isabel). One would assume that this storm would have significantly altered the land cover.

Response: Individual model components and data inputs to FEMA's HAZUS program are many, complicated and slow to change. It was not until 2015 that the model incorporated data from the 2010 Census, and the model still runs on outdated versions of the requisite GIS software. However, HAZUS is the only tool we know that provides useful hurricane vulnerability numbers for planning purposes such as this. Our HAZUS consultants indicate that the apparent focus of recent updates to HAZUS have been making certain that the building and population data are as up to date as possible.
